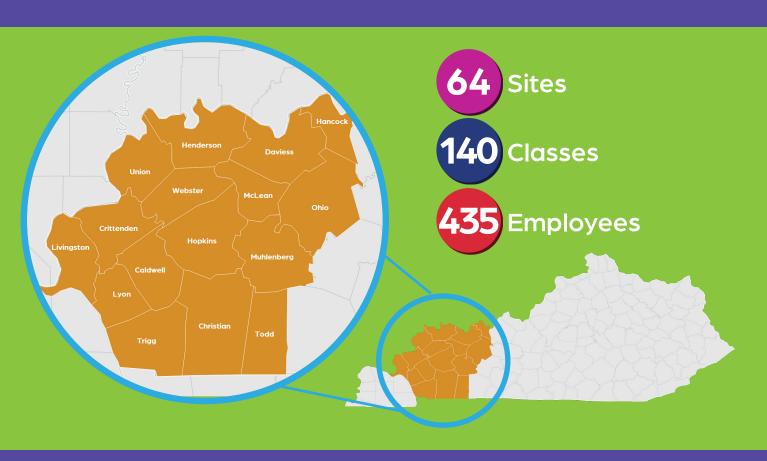


Who We Are

The Audubon Area Head Start program consists of Head Start, Early Head Start, Child Care Partnerships (EHS-CCP), and Western Kentucky University Delegate (WKU). Program options include center-based classrooms, home-based visitation, a combination model, and child care partners. We promote school readiness for at-risk children from birth to age five by providing comprehensive child and family centered services that foster healthy development of children throughout 16 counties in western Kentucky.



Program Goals

Health

To ensure all families have access to a support system designed to assist children and engage families in comprehensive services including health, nutrition, mental health, and disabilities.

Child Development

To provide children and their families comprehensive services that foster children's development and competence in all learning areas to support the foundation for school readiness during the early years.

Parent Engagement

To support parents/guardians in their role as primary caregivers and educators of their children, in meeting family goals, and provide support so parents may achieve self reliance and self sufficiency.

Program Design and Management

To ensure comprehensive services are provided to Head Start children and families by maintaining all federal, state, and local regulations and ensuring a system that guarantees proper planning and efficient program operation.

AAHS Makes a Difference

Kolton's family is just one of our many success stories that have come from the resources and assistance that Crittenden County Early Head Start full day/full year program provides. Kolton began our program at around 6 weeks of age. Through developmental screeners, we were able to recognize that Kolton's speech was not progressing at his developmental age. He was able to receive speech therapy during school hours to assist his Nana, Suzzanne, with ensuring his speech foundation was growing even though she was at work. When COVID hit, Kolton received virtual services with an SLP (speechlanguage pathologist) his teacher was able to provide oneon-one interventions aligned with instructions from his SLP. Kolton began his disability intervention journey with our teachers in June 2020 and was not speaking any words or interacting with his peers. As of today, Kolton is joining in on games, singing songs, following instructions, speaking words, phrases and sentences. Kolton can count to 10 and identify his colors. We are so proud of the progress that Kolton is making through developmentally appropriate, individualized activities, and speech services!

AAHS Responds to COVID-19

The 2020-2021 program year was full of hope for a return to normal from COVID-19. While we had moments of normal, like getting out of masks and reduced COVID numbers, our nation continued to have peaks of COVID cases and returns to mask mandates. Our program has taken pride in the fact that we have been open throughout the entire COVID process in some form and open to in person services as soon as allowable by the Governor. In 2020-2021 we saw mandated school closures in late 2020, and we experienced impacts of classroom closures due to COVID exposure as well as staff shortages in the spring of 2021.

Audubon Area Head Start staff worked long and tiring hours to provide services for the children of Western Kentucky. Often understaffed and having workloads larger than normal, the staff worked through ever changing rules and regulations to provide high quality education to the students in their care. Advocates worked with families to provide resources and information to assist in getting through the COVID pandemic. Education about the benefits of the COVID vaccine were provided to staff and families throughout the year in addition to updated vaccine clinic information. Managers and support staff worked behind the scenes to adjust staff schedules, recruit potential candidates, and hire new staff to ensure uninterrupted service delivery for children and families.

In difficult times, the staff of Audubon Area Head Start continued to provide and often increased the services to families. Along with education services, Audubon staff provided health services, family services, and increase mental health services to the children and families served. These services are central to Head Start and became even more important throughout the course of the pandemic.

The challenges of working through the COVID pandemic have been substantial. Audubon Area Head Start would like to thank every staff member, school partner, childcare partner, and the families associated with Head Start! Working together as a community and pulling together resources allowed Head Start to achieve success in the midst of a most challenging environment!

School Readiness Goals

Physical Development

Children will use their large and small muscles. They will also use healthy and safe habits.

Language Development

Children will be able to understand and use expanded language to express their wants and needs to engage in conversations and follow directions.

Social and Emotional Development

Children will learn how to recognize and regulate their feelings. They will also develop positive relationships with adults and peers.

Literacy

Children will have knowledge of print and know that print is meaningful.

Approaches to Learning

Children will demonstrate flexibility, inventiveness, curiosity, motivation, persistence, and engagement in learning.

Cognition and General Knowledge

Children will use math in everyday routines to count, compare, pattern, and problem solve.

Preparing Children for Success

Curriculum

At Audubon Area Head Start, The Creative Curriculum for Infants, Toddlers, and Twos is used in Early Head Start. The Creative Curriculum for Preschool is used in our preschool classrooms. These curricula are research-based which allows and encourages teachers to involve children in their own learning by choosing activities and topics that are meaningful to the children. This approach ensures that children make gains in all developmental domains outlined in the Kentucky Department of Childhood Learning Standards and the Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework.

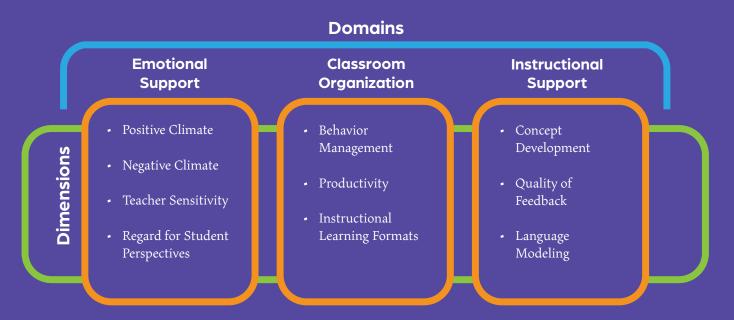

My Teaching Strategies is the authentic, observational assessment system used by Audubon Area Head Start. It aligns with The Creative Curriculum and is used to document children's development and learning over time. We are able to collect and gather child outcome information to guide program planning and professional development. Our teachers complete a comprehensive assessment on each child three times per year. Teaching staff assess the work collected for each child's portfolio and determine the skill level of children on various learning outcomes. They use this information to design activities that support and encourage individual skill development. The results of each assessment are shared through home visits and parent teacher conferences.

CLASS Scores



The Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS) assesses interactions between teachers and children in ten dimensions within three domains. The Office of Head Start believes the domains of quality measured by CLASS remain central to its approach to child development and education and serve as important indicators of the future school readiness of all Head Start children.



Dual Language Learners

Who are dual language learners? According to the Office of Head Start, "Dual language learners are children learning two or more languages at the same time, as well as those learning a second language while continuing to develop their first (or home) language."

Children Must be Healthy to Learn

Enrolled children and pregnant mothers receive comprehensive health services including medical, dental, mental health, nutritional and prenatal assistance. Staff work with parents to ensure children are up-to-date on medical and dental requirements outlined in the Kentucky Early Periodic Screening Diagnostic Treatment Plan (EPSDT).

A wide range of partners including pediatricians, dentists, health departments, managed care organizations and hospitals work with Head Start program staff to meet the health care needs of children and pregnant mothers. Children with special health care needs are welcomed into the program.

We partner with First Steps and local school districts to make certain children receive specialized therapies addressing individualized needs. Nutritional needs of children are evaluated, individualized and met on a daily basis.

Health literacy events are implemented to educate families on diabetes, colds vs. flu, when to take their child to the doctor and nutrition as it relates to healthy brain development and healthy eating. Other parent health activities focus on the importance of early childhood health screenings.

Federal Review

From June 8, 2021 to June 11, 2021, the Administration for Children and Families (ACF) conducted a Focus Area One (FA1) monitoring review of the Audubon Area Community Services, Inc. Head Start and Early Head Start programs. The FA1 review allows the OHS to understand how programs are progressing in providing services in the 5-year grant cycle. The resulting report contains information about the grantee's performance and compliance with the requirements of the Head Start Program Performance Standards (HSPPS) or Public Law 110-134, Improving Head Start for School Readiness Act of 2007. The report for Audubon Area Community Services, Inc. Head Start and Early Head Start programs contained no Opportunity for Continuous Improvement, no Area of Concern, no Area of Noncompliance, and no Deficiencies.

Community Assessment

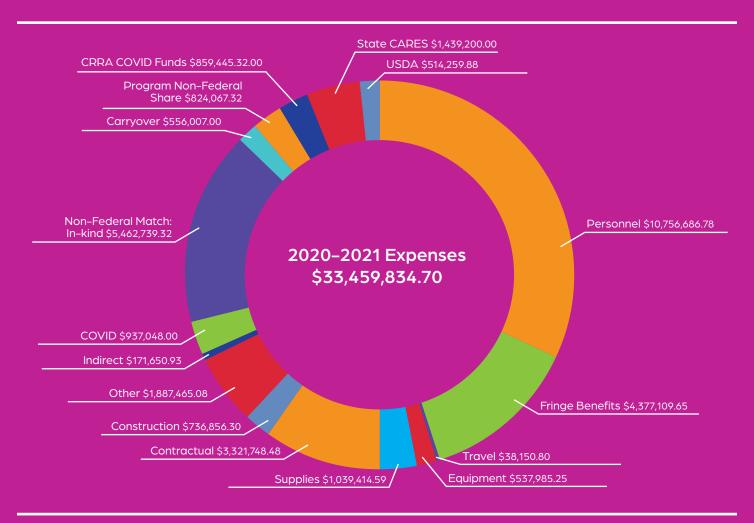

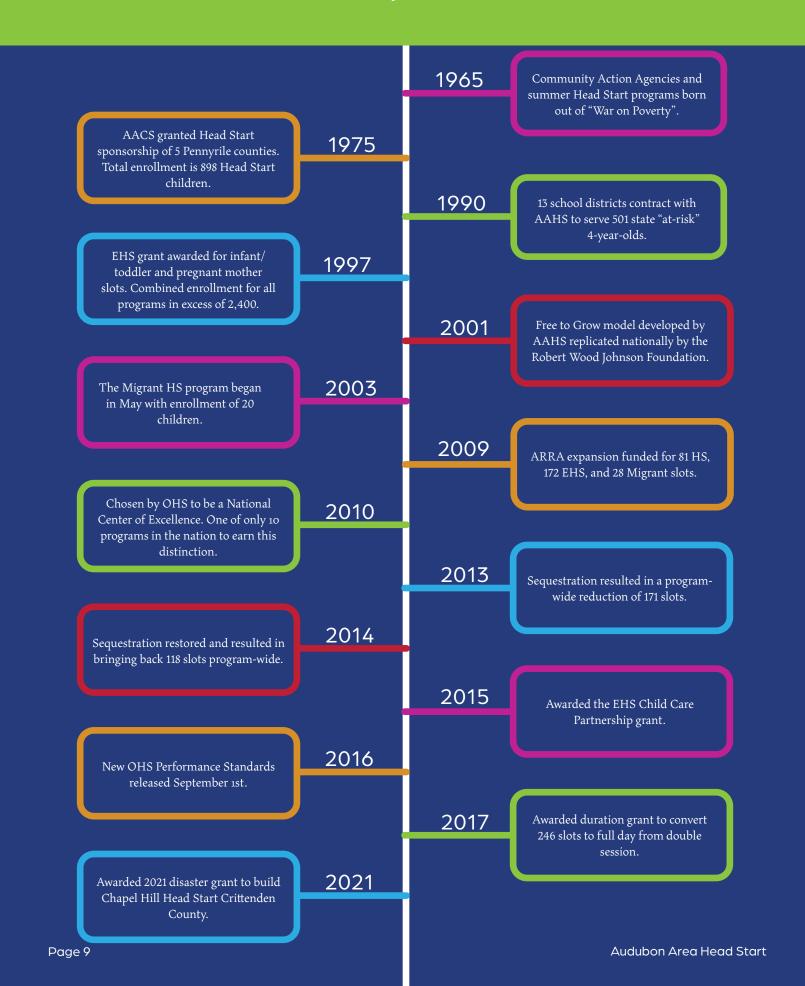
Financial Audit Results
